

Who was our guest speaker and why did he come to Cleveland?

The Republican National Convention will take place in Cleveland, starting on July 18th. The city will be flooded by delegates, world-wide media, curious tourists, and lots of Americans with opinions on the outcome of the event. As we learned from our guest, Kris Hermes, there are many issues which will be addressed by demonstrators on all sides, including local groups such as Cleveland Peace Action. It is for this reason that we joined with other organizations in inviting Mr. Hermes to Cleveland to share his extensive experience related to past demonstrations, how they were pursued by

local citizens, and how they were addressed by local authorities.

Hermes, author of "Crashing the Party: Lessons & Legacies from the RNC 2000", is a Bay Area-based activist who has worked for nearly thirty years on social justice issues. He has been an active. award-winning legal worker, member of National the Lawyers Guild, and part of numerous law collectives and legal support efforts over



pressive policing models, contemporary political repression and collective resistance.

It is not surprising that the local authorities, along with the FBI and CIA, are making plans for the Cleveland RNC: deciding where demonstrators will be allowed to gather, what levels of enthusiasm are beyond acceptable limits, what crowd-control equipment should be purchased, and even more disturbing, what individuals and groups should be monitored as plans are made for demonstrations. At past events, many demonstrators have been detained, arrested, and even locked up for significant times, without the ability to reach out for legal assistance.

Mr. Hermes explained issues such as getting permits in advance, how organizers must avoid being targeted. How a "Jail Support Team" should track arrests throughout jail-stays, so no individual is forgotten and left to indefinite detention or unpayable bails. He stressed the importance of how the media describe the efforts of the activists and the reactions of the law enforcers.

Cleveland Peace Action thanks Kris Hermes for his work, and requests that the federal, state, and city authorities overseeing the RNC should respect the rights of well-behaved demonstrators at this historic event. The world's eyes are upon Cleveland. Let's show how democracy works! Bill Fickinger



Move the Money - Fund Our Communities Action Group

Our 15 member team works to increase public pressure for reduced military spending by at least 25% and in support of the People's Budget. We are also exploring how to gain more attention to and funding for our neglected neighborhoods vs downtown projects and development. Twenty Organizations have joined the Fund Our Communities Coalition and lend their name and support in this work.

Here's what we do:

•Distribute an effective new MTM flyer.

•Promote and present our power point presentation -most recently at an April 12 Peace@thePub.

•Organize public support for the Congressional Progressive Caucus' People's Budget: Prosperity Not Austerity, including asking selected city councils to pass our draft resolution.

•Take our "How do you want your tax dollars spent" poll to area college campuses.

•Organize tax day actions.

In coordination with CPA's advocacy team, we lobby our congress members to:

•Vote for the People's Budget

•Cut funding for nuclear weapons modernization - cosponsor the Smarter Approach to Nuclear Expenditures (SANE) Act a bill that would save taxpayers approximately \$100 billion over ten years by scaling down, delaying, or canceling a variety of obsolete nuclear weapons programs.

•Reduce/eliminate the Overseas Contingency Fund (OCO) war funding slush fund

•Cut funding for the F-35

CPA Prepares for the RNC

CPA board members Sharon Bennett, Don Bryant, Chantal Dothey, Nina McLellan and Toni Roszahegyi are active participants in activist planning for the Republican National Convention to take place in Cleveland July 18-23. There will be huge attention to what is taking place and a great opportunity to promote our peace and justice messages.

These are in the planning stage:

1. A March for Economic Justice - End Poverty Now to take place on Monday, the first day of the convention. Larry Bresler, Organize Ohio organizes the planning. A march permit has been submitted to the City. The ACLU and Ohio Lawyer's Guild are partnering with us.

2. The People's Peace and Justice Convention the weekend before the RNC starts.

3. Real Neighborhoods of Cleveland tours: Cleveland Non-violence Network and AFSC are the convention and tour conveners.

In addition to bringing in Kris Hermes, (see page 1) we've helped develop a sign-on letter of concerns and organized a March 21st press conference calling for transparency, citizen input and Cleveland City Council passage of our demilitarization resolution. Toni Roszahegyi has also submitted a request for information about what crowd control equipment is being purchased.

Toni Rozsahegyi, Chair of CPA, Police De-militarization Action Group, was a speaker and, with Don Bryant and, Nina McLellan. CPA was a key organizer of the press conference, which was supported by over 20 organizations. Speakers included representatives of the ACLU, Ohio Chapter National Lawyers Guild, NAACP, Black on Black Crime, and Cleveland Action. Toni has submitted, in our name, a de-militarization resolution which we urge Cleveland City Council to pass, and equipment records request to the Mayor's office.

OUTREACH:

CPA has invited the Cleveland community to join us in visiting the Islamic Center of Cleveland. Through better knowledge and deeper understanding, we hope to counter growing Islamophobia. We were pleased to meet Shirien Muntaser, who has agreed to join our Board. Shirien will help us reach out to the local Muslim community which is under great pressure caused by the multifaceted crises in the Middle East.

Shiren has described the most basic goals of Cleveland Peace Action in the form of a poem, which begins thusly:

COMMENCING PEACE: THE NEW ERA: THE GOLDEN MEAN

In A Day And Age Of Self-Righteousness, Let Us Not Forget Man Can Not Stand Alone My intent is only to deliver truth from the depth of my being For the reverence of mankind To the people of hatred who walk blindly in this world Their eyes covered with delusions of genocide Raising their fists of intolerance Towards innocent men, women, and children Let it be known: The Dawn Of A New Era Has Begun!

Some Comments on the FY17 Federal Budget

President Obama released his last budget in February. Unfortunately, he continues to fund the insane "modernization" of nuclear weapons and their delivery systems that will cost us, the taxpayers, a staggering **ONE TRILLION** dollars over thirty years.

That's **\$100 million wasted every day** for thirty years on weapons we are <u>supposed to be getting rid</u> <u>of.</u> That's enough to send nine million young Americans to a university for four-years.

There's more money requested for the "emergency" war fund with money directed to increased military actions in Lybia, war equipment for eastern European NATO countries and for anti-ISIS action.

Over the next few months these issues will come up in the Presidential debates and in Congressional actions on the budget. Republicans will likely cut human needs programs while increasing Pentagon spending on nuclear weapons.

News from National Peace Action

As of April first, Peace Action and Peace Action West are a single non-profit entity following a vote of national membership. Affiliates like ours participate in bi-weekly conference calls to keep abreast of what is happening on our priority issue areas and to coordinate our work. National's annual organizer meeting will be held May 23 and 24 with a lobby day on the 25th. We've already had a chance to review draft national campaign plans for Nuclear Weapons abolition, Iran, Move-the-Money, and Syria/Iraq/ISIS. Peace Action has convened working groups on these issues with other national organizations.





An Unforgettable Film

Last December, CPA sponsored the World Premier showing of a mind-blowing film: **Ghost Town: the Hebron Story** at the new Cleveland Cinematheque at the Cleveland Institute of Art. The event was hosted by John Cameron Ewing, director of the Cinematheque.
