

### **CPA Advocacy Action**

Action At a Feb.20th press conference on the federal budget, Nina McLellan joined Amy Hanauer, Director Policy Matters Ohio, and Harriet Applegate, Executive Secretary, North ShoreAFL-CI0 Federation of Labor, to demand "No Cuts!" to existing social programs. Nina's remarks follow.


Good afternoon. I'm Nina McLellan, Co-president of Cleveland Peace Action, a member of the NO CUTS Coalition, and I want to tell you how and why we can safely slim down the Pentagon spending.

Congress should close additional tax loopholes, but their focus now is to cut spending. While they may let sequestration happen, eventually they must reach a budget compromise. Without raising more revenue significantly, they have only two choices: either cut programs


vital to the 99% of us – or cut Pentagon runaway spending.

Over half of any cuts should come from the Pentagon budget. The Pentagon has the highest budget in real dollars since World War II, almost doubling in the last 10 years! Without including Afghanistan and Iraq war costs, the Pentagon budget since 2000 grew three times the rate of domestic programs.

We can't protect essential programs without shutting down the Pentagon's apparently insatiable budget appetite. But across the board cuts are not



federal departments, an estimated \$102 billion! It is the only department which is not, and cannot be, audited.



Long-time CPA member, Norm Robbins, comments on the dangers of Senate Resolution 65 which was recently co-sponsored by both Ohio Senators: Sherrod Brown and Rob Portman, as well as a related bill before the House of Representatives.

When powerful senators from both parties officially announce that the US should back Israel in the event of an ill-conceived attack on Iran, it undermines ongoing diplomatic efforts and normalizes the idea of bombing Iran. It totally disregards American and Israeli intelligence that Iran is not working now on a nuclear weapon, and green-lights Prime Minister Netanyahu's apocalyptic dream of attacking Iran in "self-defense", even though he is opposed by most Israeli military and intelligence leaders. As Senator Graham said about this Resolution which he co-authored: "If Israel acts in its own defense — even preemptively — we will support Israel economically, diplomatically, and politically."

An attack on Iran would be shortsighted and tragic. Let your senators know you're not going to sit back quietly while they take us on a path toward war. Tell Senators Brown and Portman (202-224-3121) they have no right to let Israel decide whether America is economically ruined or whether its military should be put in harm's way.

There is a similarly inappropriate bill being considered by the House of Representatives. HR850 recklessly seeks to create an artificial "red line" for military action against Iran. It does so by seeking to force the Obama Administration to shift from a policy predicated on the declaration that Iran will not be permitted to obtain a nuclear weapon, to one predicated on a declaration that Iran will not be permitted to obtain nuclear weapons *capability*. This vague formulation, which has been previously promoted in Congress and was rejected by leading American security experts - clearly seeks to lower the bar for war. HR850 also increases sanctions which will disproportionately harm ordinary Iranians, and further complicate meaningful negotiations.

## The long slow trip to ZERO 75 years of suicidal foolishness

It was just about 75 years ago that physicists discovered that a rare type of uranium will break up and release a lot of energy when its nucleus is hit by a neutron. This could be used to produce electricity. But there's more to the story: when the nucleus breaks up, it shoots out other neutrons, which can then break up other nuclei. Fantastic! This chain reaction might be used to make a bomb, a *thousand* times more powerful than TNT.

An army of physicists and engineers, many of whom had escaped from Hitler's horrors, teamed up to build a bomb. By the time one was ready, Germany had surrendered. It will be argued forever whether nukes should have been used against Japan, or if a demonstration detonation might have brought about an equally quick surrender. (How would the European war have ended if the bombs were ready a year sooner?)

Some of the researchers moved on to design reactors for electric power; most returned to their university labs and classrooms; others couldn't resist building bigger bombs, even a *million* times more powerful than TNT. The nuclear weapons industry was born, financed by the government in the belief that the US would be impregnable. Many of the "fathers of the bomb," expressed great concern over this expansion, organizing groups which continue today to seek a ban on *all* such weapons.

The USSR soon caught up with the US, and a decades-long race was on. By 1986, the US had 23 thousand warheads and the USSR about 41 thousand. That each side had enough to obliterate the other was known as **MAD** – mutual assured destruction. Some in Washington tried to sweeten the terrifying situation by announcing "**Atoms for Peace**", spreading reactor technology around, promising cheap electricity for the entire world. The teetering balance of MAD was soon undone with the arrival of anti-ballistic-missiles – **ABM**'s. The Cold War became more unpredictable, as neither side had any assurance of "winning".

A series of treaties starting in the 1960's began to reduce the threat: the **SALT** strategic arms limitation treaties stipulated maximum numbers of delivery vehicles; the **NPT** non-proliferation treaty got most non-nuclear countries to promise to stay that way; the **CTBT** (comprehensive test ban treaty) - *still awaiting US ratification*) has been debated for 16 years. In 2010, Obama and Medvedev signed the **New Start Treaty** which greatly cuts the allowed numbers of delivery vehicles and warheads (around 1500 warheads, drastically down from the 20-30 thousand of 20 years ago).

Nevertheless, the industry persists today. Given the size of the stockpile, the expensive ongoing US program does nothing to increase the safety of the country. An obvious objective is support for industries in certain congressional dis-

tricts. Who should be in charge of the program: DOE, DOD, Congress? Might it be better to turn to technical, scientific and diplomatic experts? How much money should be spent to maintain this program? Other than keeping the stockpile safe, including *disassembly* of US and Russian weapons, and global monitoring of all nuclear programs, why spend more money on a program that makes the planet less safe?

How do we get out of this mess? If each nuclear or would-be nuclear state believes that it needs these weapons as insurance against attack, then the planet needs a general in-

surance policy covering all nations. Every nation must allow continuous inspections by an expanded **International Atomic Energy Agency**. The original five "nuclear states" must agree to provide protection for all the other countries.

Since the processing of uranium for power reactors is easily extended to that for bombs, all enrichment facilities must be monitored. New laser techniques for enrichment which can be easily concealed must be stopped.

The next step is the *discontinuation of all* uranium processing: shutting down *all* reactors and bomb programs. While this sounds improbable, it is worth thinking about. The value of the nuclear power industry is currently in question: most reactors are old and many insufficiently maintained; problems with the disposal of radioactive waste have not been resolved. Wind and solar energy technologies are developing rapidly. The planet can get along just fine without *any* uranium technology. Let us make sure that it will not take a nuclear war or dreadful accident to convince us to go there.

## Cleveland Peace Action, Alternatives to Military Recruitment Committee Peace Studies at MLK

Elisa Bredendiek, under contract to the Alternatives to Military Recruitment (AMR) Committee of Cleveland Peace Action, has been working at Martin Luther King High School since September of 2012. She feels blessed to teach a 90-minute block class to juniors titled "Peace Studies." Martin Luther King High School is currently the only Cleveland public high school that offers peace studies as an elective.

Her class combines theory about domestic and international politics with hands-on community involvement. Students study concepts such as racism, poverty, the military industrial complex, non-violence, mediation, and peace advocacy. Their community activities include sending books to local prisoners, writing letters on behalf of a campaign against child soldiers, providing food and support to the homeless, hosting peace jams (they had 350 people in the auditorium this winter),

and hearing guest speakers from SOA Watch, Veterans for Peace, and other community partners. By getting involved in community activities, the students learn that building peace requires personal commitment and action.

This spring will be equally busy as the students are currently in the process of applying for summer jobs and internships. They also plan to attend Earth Fest, the Cleveland Film Festival, and Parade the Circle. ### A pillar of the peace movement

### Gino Raffaelli June 3, 1925 – January 10, 2013

From the early days of the Nuclear Weapons Freeze in 1982, Gino was there. He helped found Performers and Artists for Nuclear Disarmament in 1984 and was its only President. PAND did many things but the centerpiece was a grand concert every August to remember the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. The Plain Dealer dubbed him "Cleveland's peace impresario."

As a musician, Gino worked tirelessly for peace by sharing his artistic and organizing talents to move us deeply, through the universal language of music. PAND also raised vital funds in support of Cleveland Peace Action Education Fund and many other worthy peace, anti-war and non-violence causes.





Peace was not Gino's only political passion. As a Cleveland Orchestra violinist for 44 years, he was also a union organizer, instrumental in founding the International Conference of Symphony and Opera Musicians in 1962. For bringing fair labor practices to his brothers and sisters, Gino was moved permanently to Second Violin by conductor George Szell.

Gino's dedication and energy was an example for us all. He was fully engaged, even for last August's concert, as his health was failing.

Cleveland Peace Action gratefully salutes Gino Raffaelli and the hundreds of talented musicians he recruited, organized and inspired over so many years, and who, in turn, inspired us. He was a pillar of the peace movement who will be missed and long remembered.


